Use everyday routines to build language skills. For example, during snack time you can say, "You have an apple! Apples are crunchy and sweet. What else is crunchy?" or "Can you find something in the kitchen that starts with the same sound as 'banana'?" Talking with your child about what they see, hear, and do throughout the day helps grow their vocabulary, builds connections between words and meaning, and lays the foundation for reading and communication.

Sung to "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star"
